You are making a difference

The Friends' School, like many independent schools, relies on charitable giving to fulfil our vision and the School's Purpose and Concerns. Friends' is a not-for-profit organisation and philanthropy plays a vital role in enabling programs and projects that fall outside operational budgets. Gifts from families, alumni, staff, and friends support our students today while also ensuring a strong legacy for future generations.

As many of you know, we examine and incorporate the Quaker testimony of community at The Friends' School. We reflect on how it is lived at our school and the importance of our role in the local and global community. There are many ways in which community is embodied at Friends' and you, our kind community of donors, are at the heart of making a positive difference.

In 2019, thanks to the support of our Friends' community, we showed our belief in the importance of a Friends' education, increasing our annual giving by 13% from the previous year. Importantly, we had 90 new donors who showed belief in our School and the transformation that can occur through philanthropy.

In the past year, our donors have helped students from around Australia receive a Friends' education, who would not have otherwise afforded to do so. Donations have also supported new facilities, including a planned Morris walkway, which will improve the experience for our primary students moving around the Argyle Street Campus. The funds received for our Libraries support vital information literacy by fully enabling online databases and e-book catalogues for all students, Kindergarten to Year 12.

The recent challenges and impacts of the COVID-19

global pandemic have been vast and tested the strength of our community. In response, the Board of Governors established a special purpose COVID-19 Emergency Fees Relief Fund to directly support those families who have, and in many cases, continue to experience financial hardship as a result of the pandemic. The financial support for this Fund has been inspiring and humbling, with many people reaching out and providing assistance to our families encountering financial distress as a result of COVID-19.

The revitalisation of our giving programs has been pleasing over the last two years, however, we must continue to nurture philanthropy for sustained growth and advancement of our school. With the Campus Redevelopment Phase One on the near horizon, philanthropy will be vital to assist the transformation of the built environment. Good buildings support and enhance teaching and learning, engagement and student growth.

It is our pleasure to thank you for your generosity and belief in our current and future Friends' students.

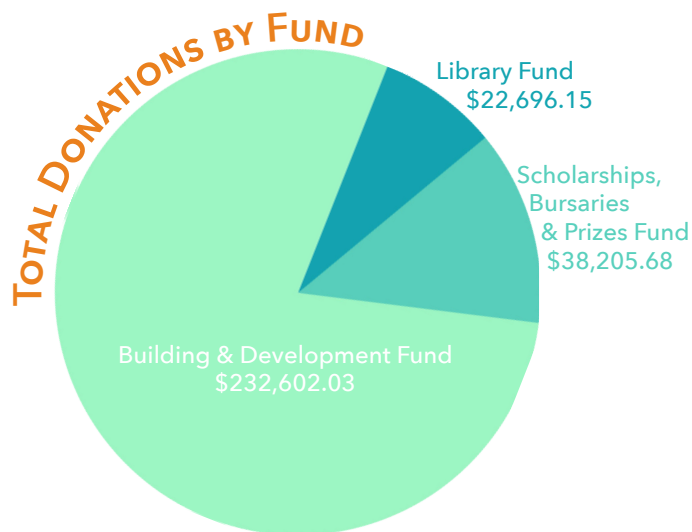

Friends Together 2019

Annual Giving is a time when the Friends' community comes together to raise funds for vital programs and projects that have immediate outcomes and benefits for students. During 2019, 146 generous community members donated \$41,917.31 to our annual giving appeal, Friends Together 2019. We thank each and every supporter for their care and concern for the students of The Friends' School.

From the total funds raised, \$33,201.00 was raised for The Friends' Fellowship. Established in 2018, and funded entirely by community donations, The Friends' Fellowship provides financial assistance to families who can least afford a Friends' education, and who will benefit greatly from attending the School.

Recipients do not sit an exam, rather they demonstrate their commitment to academic achievement, service, community and the values of the School through a written application, interview and references from teachers and community members. So far three students have been able to commence at Friends' thanks to this program, funded entirely by donations from our community.

We welcome our 2019 recipient to the Friends' learning community and thank our donors for making this opportunity possible.

\$5,259.40 was raised for the Library Fund to fund vital online resources and e-catalogue subscriptions - resources that are more important than ever for our students in these times of Distance Learning. We thank our Library supporters for continuing to value the role of libraries in our School, and all

they have to offer.

Lastly, \$3,456.91 was raised as a contribution towards the Morris Undercover Walkways providing much needed shelter for students, staff and families walking from Wells to the Library. A Development Application has now been submitted and we will keep you updated about the progress of the Walkway as the project progresses.

The Friends' Fellowship 2021-2022

Even though the annual giving program did not proceed this year, the School is grateful to still be able to offer The Friends' Fellowship this year thanks to a generous donation of \$20,000 from community members Neil Roberts (1966) and his wife Liz Roberts.

An inspiring gift from Joan Buckie

Joan Buckie, artist and old scholar, passed away in November 2019 at the age of 91. In her Will, Joan included a generous gift of \$120,000 to the School.

Joan's bequest was a thank you for the education she received at Friends', as well as to support those who would follow her at the School. Joan believed it was important to contribute to society and was a generous donor to many

charitable organisations during her lifetime, including The Friends' School.

Joan's gift will contribute to vital building works on the High School campus under the Campus Redevelopment Phase 1 project. Through her support of this transformational development Joan's gift will help deliver the best environments for students to learn, and thereby contribute to enhanced educational outcomes for generations of students.

Joan valued education and this broad reaching impact is a fitting legacy for such a generous gift.

Joan was born in 1928 to draughtsman and artist Harry Buckie and Myrtle Mary (nee Hewett); Myrtle passed away shortly after Joan was born.

Harry and Joan lived in Sydney during the 1930s, where Harry was employed as night watchman at the War Museum in the Exhibition Building. The Buckies briefly lived in Queensland before relocating to Hobart in 1935, where Harry secured a position as draughtsman with the Hydro-Electric Commission; initially they lived in the Tower on the corner of Tower Road and New Town Road.

Harry's ongoing passion for painting, particularly the Hobart waterfront, introduced him to fellow Tasmanian artists, Max Angus, Jack Carrington Smith, Edith Holmes, Lucien Dechaineaux and Ralph Hope-Johnstone (who later married artist Elspeth Vaughan).

In 1942, when Joan was 14 years old, Harry married former Friends' Prep teacher Margaret Burrows, who also attended Friends' as a student from 1917 to 1924.

Harry was a founding member of The Sunday Painters, taking excursions into the Tasmanian wilderness with fellow watercolourists Max Angus, Patricia Giles, Roy Cox and Elspeth Hope-Johnstone (nee Vaughan), a contemporary of Joan's at Friends' High School; Joan also became a member of The Sunday Painters. The group regularly painted together until the mid-1970s, and held numerous individual and group exhibitions.

The Buckies shared a concern for the Tasmanian landscape and environment, and were also members of the Hobart Walking Club, an organisation that included many people associated with Friends', including Jack Thwaites and Bob Mather. It is thought that Harry met Margaret Burrows through the Hobart Walking Club.

Joan attended Friends' High School between 1936 and 1945. She was a bright student who took an active part in the life of the school, receiving numerous Form and Literary society prizes. She was at Friends' at another historically difficult time - during World War 2. Although this may have actively constrained her education it did not limit her mind or her artistic ability.

Under the guidance of progressive Headmaster, Ernest Unwin - a champion of arts and crafts in the school curriculum, and prolific watercolourist - Joan's passion and talent for painting was further encouraged and nurtured. Joan qualified for a University entrance scholarship and in 1946 she commenced an Arts degree at the University of Tasmania (UTAS). While at UTAS Joan was awarded a number of additional scholarships and prizes, including the Jane Christine Hogg Scholarship (shared), awarded to a female candidate who obtains the highest scores in any two or more modern languages; Sir Richard Dry Exhibitions, awarded for the encouragement of learning; and the Rev Dr James Scott Memorial Prize, awarded for the highest score in English Literature.

Following graduation Joan lived and worked in Canberra as a public servant and researcher enjoying an international career with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. She had an active mind and was culturally aware. She was

well travelled and lived in Scotland, the UK and Thailand. Not only was she a very good artist in her own right, she attended concerts, the opera and the theatre. She was also an actor in the local theatre in Canberra, Hobart and in Scotland where she lived for about 12 months in the 1950's. Joan Buckie 'let her life speak'. Her pursuit of education, career and the arts and her care for family, friends and her community are an inspiration to us all. We thank Joan for her generous and thoughtful gift.

The Mather Endowment Trust helps transform the lives of students every year. Funds from the Trust are used solely to provide a Friends’ education to students whose families are without the financial means to attend the School. Recipients do not sit an exam, rather they demonstrate their commitment to academic achievement, service, community and the values of the School through a written application, interview and references from teachers and community members.

In 2019, The Mather Endowment Trust assisted 21 students to attend Friends’ as day and boarding students. This included nine new students who commenced with Friends’ in 2019.

Many students have gone on to make a positive impact locally and globally. In recent years, graduates have gone on to postgraduate study in Engineering, Geology, Science, Arts and Sport. They have attended Universities in Tasmania, interstate and overseas with some gaining scholarships for their postgraduate studies. All have expressed heartfelt gratitude for the opportunity to access a Friends’ education

and become part of the Friends’ learning community.

The Trust was established in 2011 following a generous philanthropic gift from Andrew and Jennifer Brice, descendants of the Mather family. In 2018 a further generous gift was made to the Trust by Jim and Jane Walker who were motivated by the needs-based financial assistance provided by the Trust to students each year.

The Board comprises the Presiding Member of the School’s Board of Governors (or their delegate), the Principal and three independent Board Members. We thank the Trustees, Danny McCarthy (Chair), Siobhan Harpur, Nelson File, Frances Underwood and Ian Griffiths (1971), for their careful stewardship of the Trust.

Our School was established in 1887 with remarkable gifts of funds, made by donors committed to creating a school grounded in Quaker values and practice.
